A little historical fact: Norwegians did not drink much coffee back in Norway. It was just too expensive. But after settling in the United States, they soon discovered coffee was cheap and began drinking it morning, noon, afternoon and evening. And of course, it often came with something sweet. Many of our Norwegian ancestors were farmers, which meant they were up at the crack of dawn. Some were up even earlier. You don't need daylight to milk cows. In some households breakfast was served after the cows were milked. Say breakfast was at 6:00 a.m. By 9:00 a.m. a hard-working family needed some extra calories to recharge their systems. Coffee was served with sweets. Morning coffee was followed by lunch, afternoon coffee, supper and evening coffee. Evening coffee was just a time to relax and talk over the day.

#### **Sunday, May 26: Baccalaureate Sunday with one service at 9:00 a.m.**


As the church begins the long season of Pentecost and growing in the faith our graduating seniors are going out into the world to begin a lifetime of "adulting."

### A "Count Your Blessings" Moment

In the Conference room you will find the photos of all the past pastors at Christ Lutheran. The originals were burned during the fire, but Gen Wilberg worked hard to find replacements. There are not that many pictures for a

congregation that has been around for 150 years. If you look at the dates you will understand why. More than just a few of them had long pastorates at CLC: Adolph Bredeson – 1881-1902, Jacob A. O. Stub – 1902-1918, Sibert M. Topness – 1929-1944, Lars O. Tolo – 1945 – 1955, Robert J. Furreboe – 1965-1981, C. E. Bob Ally – 1982-2003 and Robert A. Garbrecht – 1988-2003.

Scott and I are among that list of names. We moved here in September of 2003. Scott retired in 2018 because of his MD. September 2024 will mark the beginning of my 22<sup>nd</sup> year. I count that long pastorate as one of our blessings almost every day. It gave our children a community to grow up in and become a part of. ## Stoughton Community Networking Conference 2024



This year we had about 42 people sign up for the Stoughton Community Networking Conference. Michael Hecht, from Skaalen Magnolia Gardens, did an excellent job of explaining how to identify Alzheimer's and Dementia and how to care for loved ones. He was very real at explaining that someday we are all going to die and rather than being sorry for loved ones as we watch them failing, he recommends embracing them with the skills and talents they have left. Treasure the time with them and meet them on their turf.



He explained that they have a short attention span, rather than watching a 2 hour movie, listen to oldies music with them, like Lawrence Welk and other tunes from their generation. Tell them who you are, "I'm your granddaughter Brenda, Linda's daughter. Remember when we had fun planting the garden together and the big cabbages we had?" Help them to be useful, "would you help me fold this laundry? Can you help me find room number 5?"

Michael gets his residents involved in the community and even leading events. He gets them started and they continue the program.

Rather than going out to eat and being asked to make a lot of decisions, bring them food, but bring enough for both of you. They want to share, if you only bring their lunch they are going to want to share. Avoid taking them on long journeys in the car.

They don't like a lot of change, they find it overwhelming. Short trips, or better yet go to see them, take a walk on the grounds. Remind them of the memories you shared together and how much fun you had. Celebrate their lives with them. Eat ice cream and treasure the day!



Laura Mays, from Stoughton Health, talked about the Stoughton Community Needs Assessment that is completed every 3 years, and the topics they are working on for a healthy community. Their top 3 priorities are currently Behavioral Health (including Mental Health and Substance Abuse), Chronic Disease and Injuries. She shared the Implementation plan and information on the many programs that are offered at the Stoughton Wellness Center at the corner of Hwy 51 and County B.



Laura Braund, from the Stoughton Area Resource Team and Sandy Harter from Joining Forces for Families did an interactive program on how easily families can fall into crisis and what they do to try to help families find hope and assistance. We discussed common challenges of housing, transportation, having a community center and help with mentoring. There was a general consensus that we never seem to have enough resources and then Donelle Scaffidi, from Eyes of Hope,



suggested some creative solutions for the future. She suggested increasing community housing and sharing a large house or building between several families to cut housing costs. Independent sleeping areas and bedrooms with a shared kitchen and living room. Community Gardens and ride share opportunities. Several people owning one car, sharing transportation needs, and carpooling when able.



Melodie LeFever and Janeal Fullmer, from JustServe.Org, talked about their volunteering program. If you have a program that needs volunteers, or you want to volunteer your time but don't know where to start, they want to help you get connected.

Pastor Paula made an excellent meal for everyone, including vegan and gluten free cuisine for our guests and we all enjoyed our time together and learned a lot!





## CHRIST LUTHERAN CHURCH 150TH ANNIVERSARY WALL BY COLLIN HARRINGTON

With a little bit of sanding, my trusty (if slightly antiquated) chop saw and a fine quiet Saturday, I was able to complete the first faze of the Christ Lutheran Church's 150th Anniversary history wall. You might have noticed the barn boards being hauled in or you might even have seen me finishing up the final boards after Sunday school let out. It's possible that you've walked down the hallway and wondered what's in store next?

Well, before I go forward, I'd like to go back. The boards themselves were donated by Phyllis Gullickson. I found them stored away in one of her barns, history written all over with each weatherworn crack and a fine layer of dust. Hauling them home, I went to work sanding down the sharpest bits as I figured folks can't help but want to touch the boards and I didn't want to be responsible for an epidemic of splinters. I would also like to thank in advance all those willing to donate a few momentos for the wall, to share their history with the church. And finally, I would like to thank all those in the future that will take the time to stop and take a look. ### Hymn Nerds For May

The Day of Pentecost is May 19th this year. Pentecost is the holiday which takes place on the 50th day after Easter Sunday. It commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon Mary, mother of Jesus and the Apostles of Jesus while they were in Jerusalem celebrating the Feast of Weeks, and is described in the Acts of the Apostles. One of Patti Boelsing's favorite hymns is "Spirit of Gentleness" with a beautiful text about the powerful role of the Spirit. The words and music were written by James Manley in 1975. It begins with the refrain, 'Spirit, Spirit of gentleness'. Each stanza unfolds a particular manifestation of the Spirit: 'You moved on the waters', 'You swept thro' the desert', 'You sang in a stable' and 'You call from tomorrow'. Get out a hymnal the next time you are in church and check out the thoughtful text of hymn #396.

## UNSUNG HERO: GLORIA HAYNE BY BRENDA ZARTH



Gloria grew up with church as part of her life. She was allowed to babysit, but no matter how late you babysat you still had to be up and ready for church in the morning.

Gloria has worked at Christ Lutheran Church for almost 46 years. She found the job advertised in the newspaper. She was interviewed by Dick Entwistle and Pastor Furboe. At the time, you could not be a member of the church while working at Christ Lutheran, so Gloria and her family remained members of St. John's Lutheran Church on the East side of Madison. Gloria was hired as a full-time Office Manager. She and her husband Lonnie did not become

members of Christ Lutheran Church until Pastor Scott and Pastor Paula were here. Pastor Alley had told her that she was free to join, but she and her family had some great friends at St. John's, so they decided to stay with their church for a few more years before transferring their membership to Christ Lutheran.

Gloria said that the thing she likes the most about working at the church is the people. She enjoyed coming to work every day. She said, "You must know that there are all kinds of people in this world, and you just need to listen to them. You want to be open with people and not turn them away". She once had a person that was having difficulty with their insurance, and they sat and talked with her for over three hours. When someone commented on how patient she was, she just shrugged it off because she realized that people sometimes just need someone to listen.

Her most challenging time at the church was when they plunked a computer on her desk and told her she would need to produce the Ambassador on it. At that point she had no training and only had a person whom she could call on the phone if she had questions. Another challenge was when she was handed over the job of Financial secretary, which was not part of her original job. She had no background in finance or accounting, so her husband Lonnie would come in to help her balance the accounts if she got stuck. But the reason that she has remained here at Christ Lutheran Church for so long is two-fold. One is the people that she has gotten to know and whom she has great friendships with. The second is that, after her husband retired, she was given the flexibility to go down to three days a week and that her least favorite jobs (i.e. working on the Ambassador and the financial books) were taken off of her hands. She has loved the flexibility that her job has offered, she loved the structure it provided. When she turned 80, she started thinking about retiring and she is now looking forward to it. She looks forward to having time in her garden and having the freedom to spend time with family and friends.

We will all miss working with and seeing her at the office window every day, but it will not be goodbye. Gloria is a member of this church, and she participates in a lot of things outside of her everyday work here. She is an organizer and member of the gardening team. She is on the Fellowship board. She helps with quilting, and she plans to continue to volunteer by helping with prep work for Sunday school and Vacation Bible School.

Jenny stated, "I am grateful for getting to work with her. My favorite memory of her is when she and Phyllis worked with me last year to help put up the finishing touches on the classrooms. They took their jobs seriously and did not stop until every little animal, vine and decoration found a place. It was a several week process and having Gloria and Phyllis there to help with the last push was so wonderful and the classrooms looked fantastic!"

Gloria is a very kind and giving person and always seems to be thinking of others. She seems to know where to find things when needed and seems very connected with the community. She has helped the Ukrainian resettlement program with donations from people moving into or out of Skaalen and downsizing. She has always seemed to know the answers and again patiently listens.

It's also been very hard to say "No" to Gloria's requests for volunteering, you know that she is dedicated to caring and it makes me want to be more caring and devoted in return. Thank you Gloria for all of your wonderful service to our church family and Happy Retirement!



Trails in this region connect the North Fork and the Middle Fork of Birch Creek. From your basecamp on the Middle Fork of Birch Creek, your crew will use crosscut and hand saws to clear these trails. Your efforts will be rewarded by stunning views of the Sawtooth Mountains, delicious food, and the warm glow of a campfire at days end. The degree of difficulty of the 7.5 mile hike in is rated as moderate and the work as difficult. We are told "volunteers can expect saw work and frequently lifting downed trees off the trail. A round trip hike of 10 miles is possible as you clear further up the trail.




**Thursday, June 13<sup>th</sup>**


