It's Stewardship Season Again! Pastor Paula Geister-Jones

It's that time of year again – **Stewardship Season.** By the time you receive this newsletter we will have already had our Ministry Fair and Blessings of the Animals and Stewardship Packets will have been mailed out.

Our theme this year is "United in Christ: Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow." Our theme verse comes from one of Luther's favorite psalm 46: "The Lord of hosts is with us; the God of Jacob is our stronghold," and our Stewardship song is one God's people have sung since the early 18th century, "O God, Our /help in Ages Past." This past year I have shared a "Count Your Blessings" article in the monthly newsletter. This year I invite you to share your stories with one another.

Here is what is happening the next two Sundays...

Sunday, October 6 is Quilt/LWR Sunday. LWR distributed its first quilts in 1945 to families in war-torn Europe following the Second World War.

Within a decade, the ministry was reaching around the globe to villages far removed from the world's attention. Today, an average of 300,000 quilts are lovingly given worldwide each year. And our hope is congregations like ours will still have Quilter groups making quilts 100 years from now.

On Quilt/LWR Sunday we focus on how people around the world experience "God with them" through the quilts of Lutheran World Relief. The pews will be covered with quilts our quilters have made over the past year. Up front will be all the School Kits, Personal Care Kits, Baby Care Kits and Sewing Kits for Lutheran World Relief. We will "count" the quilts and kits and let you know how many have been put together. Quilts will once again be on sale for \$40 apiece. Monies from the sale of quilts goes towards getting those quilts where they need to go.

Pastor Margo Martens is our guest preacher and there will be special music, but that is only the beginning of the fun.

After Worship a Pig Roast/Harvest Fest is planned from 11:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

This is a 150th Anniversary Event. For years the Men of CLC hosted a pig roast as a fundraiser. Along

with the Pig Roast there will be a **bake sale and crafts for all ages** in the Large Youth Room (Pumpkin Painting and Cookie Frosting), Pumpkin Sumo Wrestling in the narthex, and a Bounce House, a pile of hay to climb on and a Hayride in the backyard.

QUILTING AT CHRIST LUTHERAN BY COLIN HARRINGTON

Up some stairs, down a long hall, in a cold ten by twelve room, the Quilters would be busy at work. The heater in the room helped, but the hard work and lively conversation kept them even warmer. Overflow often ended up in the fellowship room; sometimes even in the hallways themselves. At any given time, year after year, roughly ten to fifteen folks could be found cutting, ironing or sewing. The end results would lead to 100 to 150 quilts being made each year.



This was how it was for many years in the old church for the Quilting groups. Starting just shortly after World War II, with many war weary folks in need of warmth, aid was needed. Christ Lutheran Church heeded that call and so began the mass creation of quilts. The groups originally met primarily in the winter, when summertime chores would not get in the way and fellowship was needed even more to get through those cold, blustery days. The groups continued to gain membership through the 50s and 60s and stayed consistent through the 70s, 80s and 90s.

It was in the 90s that it was thought to start selling some of the quilts to the congregation. The cost of shipping the quilts to Minneapolis, where Lutheran World Relief was located, was \$2.50 per quilt. By selling a few quilts, the costs of shipping and additional materials could be covered. While it is estimated that 99% of all fabric comes from donations, there is always a need for the little extras. For many Quilters, bargain hunting for that \$2 a yard bit of material is part of the fun. Goodwill, St. Vinny's, Dig and Save, even Walmart might have that elusive perfect fabric for that one particular quilt.

While talking to a few of the modern day quilters, I learned all the above and more. Along with my notes on the conversation, I jotted down the following quotes:

- "When the kids are gone, why not start quilting?"
- "Some years you have three members, the next, twenty. You don't need to get discouraged."



- "I thought, maybe I could do that. That was fourteen years ago."
- "Some come to socialize even if they can't quilt anymore. It's about communication and community."
- "Quilting is addictive."

I was also informed that post fire, our present day church set up a special place in the Sunday School classrooms with extra closet storage for the quilters. Presently, the group tends to meet starting in March through early November, every Wednesday from 8:30 a.m.-11:30 a.m..

If you are interested in learning more about Quilting, all are welcome, from the curious and new to the experienced master hand. It is a true Christ Lutheran tradition with a great history and, hopefully, a tradition that will continue.











Go and Tell






Events are planned for youth in Grades 5-8. We ask that you sign up at the Information Desk at least a week prior to the event, so we can make plans in a timely manner.


Schuster's Farm – Haunted Forest Friday, October 25th 6:15 – 8:45 p.m. Cost: \$25



A Mighty Fortress Is Our God is a hymn we always sing on Reformation Sunday which is celebrated this year on October 27. Martin Luther, lived and taught theology in Wittenberg, Germany, where he nailed his 95 Theses to the door of the Castle Church to challenge the Catholic Church's sale of indulgences. His ideas, derived from Scripture, advocated for a personal relationship with God over reliance on priests, which shifted the power from the Church to the common man.

Luther is well known for his passion for each believer to experience a personal relationship with God, and one of his key proposals for such a relationship involved music. Luther proclaimed, "music is a gift and grace of God, not an invention of men. Thus it drives out the devil and makes people cheerful," and, "The Devil, the originator of sorrowful anxieties and restless troubles, flees before the sound of music almost as much as before the Word of God."

Luther had a great influence on the development of hymnody and liturgical music in the Protestant tradition. He composed this hymn between 1527 and 1529, naming it EIN FESTE BURG from the first line of the text. Luther was a skilled musician who played the lute and the flute, and wrote many hymns to express his faith and encourage congregational singing. The oldest surviving hymnal that contains the hymn was printed in 1531. This hymnal was part of Luther's effort to promote congregational singing and to provide a collection of hymns in German for the reformed liturgy.

The hymn's title and themes are inspired by Psalm 46, which in Luther's German Bible translation states: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (Ein feste Burg ist unser Gott). The hymn paraphrases concepts from this psalm about God being a stronghold and refuge for His people amid life's trials.

In the 16th century when Luther wrote this hymn, fortresses and castles were common strategies for military defense. A fortress provided safety and protection for a town or city from attacking forces. The "mighty fortress" metaphor draws on this context. It conveys the idea of God as an impenetrable stronghold defending believers against the attacks of the devil and all evil. Just as a fortress shields a city from harm and prevails against siege, God provides an unfailing refuge for His followers amid life's hardships and trials.
