HONORING OUR VETERANS BY COLIN HARRINGTON

Last February, I sat at the 150th Anniversary committee meeting, noting ideas about what topics I should cover throughout the year for these articles. For November, I had jotted down "maybe a Thanksgiving/Be grateful theme" and under that, "Turkey/family, breaking bread/Last Super reference(?)"

However, under those thoughts I circled "Veteran's Day." I reflected on this more as I thumbed through Christ Lutheran Church's history binders; Chapter Three is titled "History - World War II."

While members of Christ Lutheran have served with great dedication and honor throughout peacetime and war, I kept coming back to this era and moment of time in our Church's and the world's history. Chapter Three begins with notes from the Bulletin, speaking of letters from home and letters back to the pastor from "Over There." One such letter, as noted in the November 22nd, 1942, Bulletin said:

"I think of you folks when I sit at our Sunday morning service and am hoping and praying that the time isn't far off when we can all be back to share your fine services with the folks back in the old home tow. We will give our best for our great country and with God's help we will be victorious. May God bless and help you in your great work."

Another bulletin, dated January 24th, 1943, read of a unique Christmas card with a poem titled "Soldier's Prayer" on it:

"While miles from home at Christmas, Lord,

This soldier's prayer to you Is that a realm of peace prevail To bring Christ's love anew.

Our erring foe from wrong to right Restore in thought and deeds. To give eternal faith and hope, And fill all human needs."



One such human need was simply the connection to the congregation. A sad tale in this chapter said a letter was received at the church from a soldier, thanking the congregation for their thoughts, prayers and for the donation of Service Prayer Books. The tragedy was that particular soldier had died days before this was printed in the bulletin. Unfortunately, this was not the only congregational member to give his complete all to a far greater good.

I feel compelled to almost write endlessly about this particular subject. It feels like a fool's errand to think that any words of thanks can be properly shared in gratitude for the great sacrifices these veterans have had to bear. These wondrous and terrible scars, internal and external, are such that many of us can never truly comprehend.

I can only simply state, thank you and we honor you; once a soldier, always a soldier.

As I finished reading the Gospel of John, after the death and resurrection of Jesus, I can't help but feel the disciples sense of "Now what do we do? We are so used to Jesus leading the way, instructing us on what to do next." All their normalcy was gone. It is the same for so many of us in this congregation who have had a dear loved one pass . "Now what do we do. All my

daily normal's are gone". In the last chapter, Peter being practical announces to the rest of them, I'm going fishing". He probably didn't have a cent in his pocket and thought "I didn't need any when I was with Jesus", but things have changed now. He knew how to catch fish and could go back to doing that for his living. Well, Jesus had other plans. While they were all in the boat fishing with Peter, Jesus appeared and had the start of breakfast going on a campfire on the beach. Once again the disciples had caught nothing while out fishing. When Jesus, unrecognizable to them at the time, told them to cast their net on the other side of the boat, they caught 153 large fish. It was then that John realized it was Jesus. It's almost comical as Jesus patiently waited for them to haul the fish in. He gave Peter a chance to undo the three times he denied even knowing Jesus at the High Priests house and declare before the others that he loved Jesus. Jesus began here to give direction to Peter and the other disciples at to what their lives would look like as a foretaste leading into the next "chapter" in their lives. That is where the book of The Acts of the Apostles continues as Luke documents this new "Chapter" and the paths those same disciples would take in starting and building up the new Christian Church.

"Jesus of Nazareth" directed by Franco Zeffirelli Thursday evenings – November 21, January 16, February 20, March 20 and April 10. 6:00 p.m. Soup and Sandwich

The mini-series was released in 1977, but I still think it is one of the best. The director set out to film the life of Christ with a \$12 million budget for an onlocation production in Morocco and Tunisia. He took over two years to prepare before filming began in September of 1975. A panel of Distinguished theologians and Biblical scholars served as his advisors and helped Zeffirelli not only aim for, but achieve, a high degree of historical accuracy—not only in the period of sets and costumes, but in the many, many details that distinguish this version of Jesus life on film from any other ever made.














We are once again having our Holiday Bake Sale. Monies from this sale will go towards scholarships and funding youth mission trips.
