## PAST CHRISTMAS PROGRAMS BY COLIN HARRING-

As we put to a close Christ Lutheran Church's 150th Anniversary, December brings with it one of the church's most cherished traditions: The annual Christmas program. Each year, the youth of the church come together, all costumed up from head to toe to play stars, mice, angels, and of course Mary and Joseph. The day of the show always is led up to by a bit of chaos, a bit of too much fun and a lot of kids being a bit shy about singing in front of the whole congregation. Maybe the wise man's beard is too itchy, or the person playing the donkey comes down with the flu. Some of the kids (usually the four to six year olds) sing with the confidence that astounds; others, barely can't wait until they can get their hands on the after show cookies.

It's been said that the show usually looks like it can barely hold together, but on the Sunday of showtime, it always comes out brilliantly. As it was said, every show is a Christmas miracle in itself.

As far as I could find digging into the church's history, it appears that as long as the church has been in existence, there have been some type of variation of a children's program. One of my favorite things I came across were family names crossing several generations, where as kids they would sing new and traditional classics. It wouldn't be hard to imagine someone seventy years ago singing the same song that their great grandchild might sing this year.

Some things obviously have changed over the years. For example, the amount of "stage room" has easily doubled since the previous churches. This of course after the fire, and a brief few years of performance at Skaalen. Also, due to the fire, all the costumes worn at the shows today had to be remade. Now, with the assistance of a lot of talented people, there are closets full of costumes again; enough for everyone to have something special to wear.

There have even been years where the show wasn't performed live, but recorded "movie style" and shown on an evening screen. Definitely a significant change of pace.

In itself, this fits the spirit of what Christ Lutheran is about: progressive, inventive yet steeped in tradition. We as a church are willing to try new songs, new costumes or new technologies, it is still in the faith of telling "The greatest story ever told."

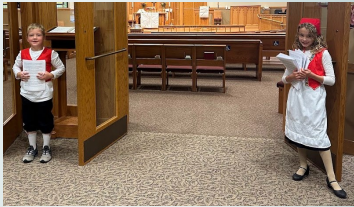

## JUDGEMENT BY AARON KNOPLOH

Judgment. Such a heavy word. A concept and practice I feel dominates our society. Today's cancel culture would not exist were it not for judgment. Judgment happens to be at the heart of a bible passage that influences me daily. Yeah, sorry, no sunshine and roses here. Just judgment.

*Matthew 7:1-6*

*"Do not judge, so that you may not be judged. For the judgment you give will be the judgment you get, and the measure you give will be the measure you get."*

We've all heard it and perhaps even heeded its warning on occasion. But hey, sometimes we can't help but be a little catty and cast sassy judgment towards unsuspecting victims. Of course it's about much more than simply refraining from judgment. It also necessitates that we ourselves be held to the same criteria. To strengthen this message, the passage goes on in a rather humorous way, in my opinion, that I was not familiar with.

*"Why do you see the speck in your neighbor's eye but do not notice the log in your own eye? Or how can you say to your neighbor, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' while the log is in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbor's eye."*

A log in our eye! It's presented in such a hilariously obvious way. Refraining from judgment is a struggle in itself, but to avoid being a hypocrite requires a whole other level of self-awareness and personal reflection. That self-awareness is indeed where we all probably struggle the most and, at times, seems to be completely lacking in our society. How often do we see people casting judgment and criticizing people while being completely ignorant to the fact that they themselves are guilty of those very transgressions? Hypocrites.

The image that flashes my way as I walk past a mirror is that of quite a sexy stud, (I'm moving pretty fast), but if I pause for a moment, the blemishes, wrinkles, bulges, and asymmetrical features all rear their less favorable head. It doesn't do much for the ego, for sure, but I feel finding those flaws certainly helps stave off casting ugly judgment.

If we can all manage to ease off the judgment and practice a little self-reflection, then perhaps we can come out on the other side with a little better understanding of each other and practice more forgiveness. Unfortunately, forgiveness is often a pretty tall order and proves to be more than we can manage, but if that's the case, perhaps we can take the advice of one of my all-time favorite TV characters—Ted Lasso. There's a great scene where a domineering prick challenges him to a game of darts. They strike up a hefty little wager and Ted's opponent, having little respect for him, smirks in confidence as he pulls out his professional set of darts. Much to everyone's surprise, Ted goes on to beat him and offers a wonderful piece of advice at the end. We should try to be more curious instead of judgmental. If his opponent had been curious enough to get to know him, perhaps he would have learned that he used to play darts with his dad almost every week. Instead, he judged him as being an unworthy opponent, and to a greater extent, a lesser person.

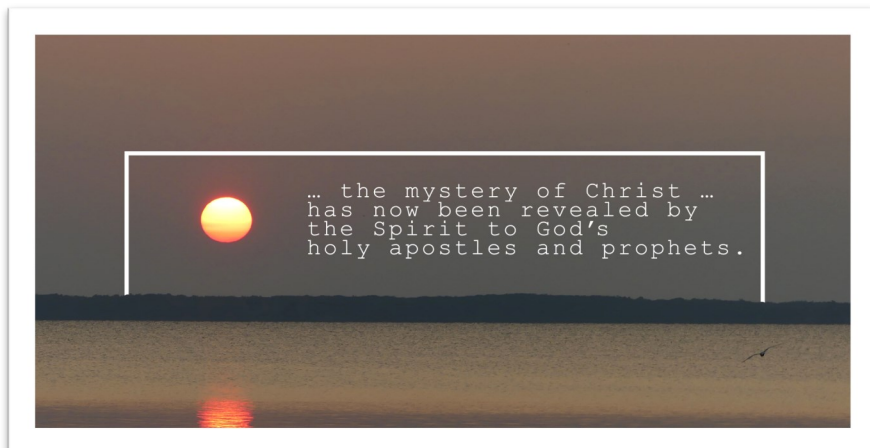
So let's be more curious about each other and leave the judgment to our laws and those that enforce them. Liars and thieves can face their consequences with the legal system and we should do our best to live a life in His image. In doing so, perhaps if we're lucky modeling that behavior might rub off on others.



The Acts of the Apostles continues on from the Gospels, where Jesus taught and demonstrated the power He had from the Holy Spirit to His Disciples, to now the disciples being directed by the Holy Spirit to carry on Jesus' ministry to the world. I had to kind of laugh in chapter 1, when the disciples needed to find a replacement for Judas Iscariot to have 12 apostles. They picked two disciples who had been followers from the beginning and were going to draw straws asking God to pick His choice. I couldn't help but think God was thinking, "They are going to what? They are going to draw straws? I could have sent Michael or Gabriel and it would have been much more majestic, but I can work with drawing straws." Maybe drawing straws was more significant than I realize in their world.

Chapter 2 deals with Pentecost; the sound of the howling wind that brought everyone in town running to find out what was going on. The Holy Spirit rested on all the believers in the room causing them to Speak in foreign languages that were not their own. Within the crowd that gathered were men and women from all over the Middle East and southern Europe recognizing these Galileans speaking in their native tongues "describing God's mighty works". I once thought about the greatest barrier to the Disciples spreading the Gospel message of Jesus and realized people not being able to understand what was being said in both directions. God took care of that for them.

Chapters 3 thru 10 contain accounts of other miracles God did. Peter healing the man crippled from birth giving him a chance to preach to the crowd that gathered. The angel lead the apostles out of the jail right past the guards into the Temple so that they could continue speaking to the people. Stephen's face appearing like that of an angel when testifying before the high priest and mob before being stoned; The rise of the young man, Saul and the persecution of the members of the new church causing the believers to flee Jerusalem and proclaim the Gospel message where ever they ended up; The appearance of Jesus to Saul on the road to Damascus and in an instance, changing Saul into Paul and making him one of the greatest witnesses for Christ ever seen.

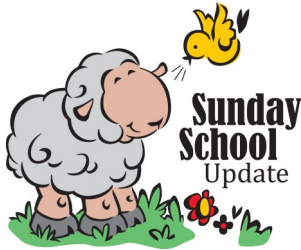

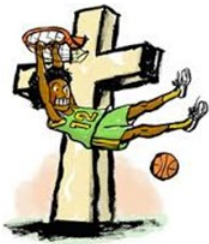
This year we are going to North Carolina to help out with the state's recovery from Hurricane Helena. Back in late September Helena not only did major damage to Florida, but dropped 15 to 30 inches of rain on western North Carolina. People living on the top of mountains lost their homes from flooding. 103 people lost their lives from drowning, collapsing homes and landslides.

We will stay at Lutheridge Camp and Conference Center Sunday - Friday. Lutheran Disaster Response has made a three year commitment to stay and help the people of North Carolina recover from the devastation. LDR has partnered with the camp in this mission - the camp provides food and housing and LDR provides the work sites. Some of our quilts and relief kits were sent to this area this year and I am excited to see firsthand the impact CLC and the Lutheran Church has in this world.

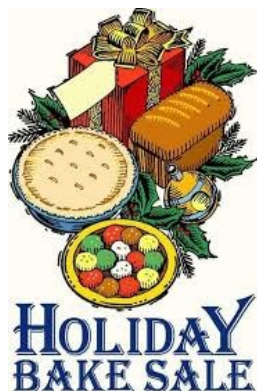

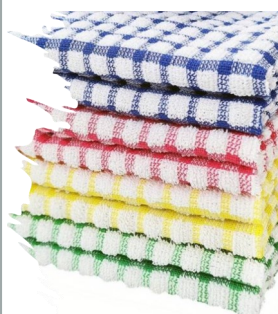

A panel of Distinguished theologians and Biblical scholars served as his advisors and helped Zeffirelli not only aim for, but achieve, a high degree of historical accuracy—not only in the period of sets and costumes, but in the many, many details that distinguish this version of Jesus life on film from any other ever made.

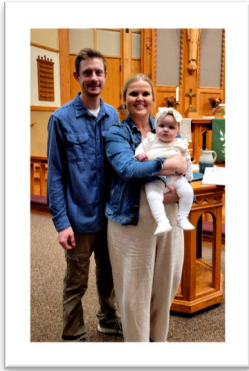

### December Hymn Nerds

Sheep scattered around, the shepherds settled in for another quiet night, probably swapping stories as they watched the flocks. Then, in a divine moment, God burst into the night. 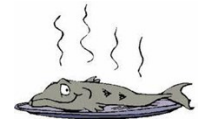
