Stewardship Update – Just a Reminder

In February at the Annual Meeting the Congregation passed a spending plan that was underfunded by \$58,000. That is just a different way of saying a \$58,000 deficit. Please think about us throughout the summer and fall and if at all possible, give a little more to make up the difference. We have roughly 200 households who contribute to the budget, some more, some less. \$58,000 divided by 200 is \$290. Not an impossible sum for most people.

God's Global Barnyard Numbers

GOOD NEWS! During the Season of Lent Christ Lutheran collected **\$1898** for **GOD'S GLOBAL BARNYARD**. What can that provide in the church's fight to break the cycle of hunger and poverty for families in desperate need? Well, ten chicks are \$10, a honey bee hive \$20, a piglet - \$30, a goat - \$50, a fish community - \$250, a cow - \$500 and a family farm that includes a cow, goats, a dozen chick, two pigs and farming tools, seed and agricultural training - \$715. We can purchase a family farm, a fish community, a cow, 6 goats and 130 chicks.

Elizabeth Circle joined in with the church in donating to the **ELCA God's Global Barnyard** by making two gifts to the ELCA one for four goats and the other was a donation of two beehives. Thanks to the Ladies of the Elizabeth Circle for their generous donation.



Organ Repair Scheduled for June

The council wants to remind you that the cost of this project \$134,000. About \$13,173 of that cost is coming from designated gifts, \$15,000 from the Foundation and \$20,000 pledged to Capital Improvements. That covers \$48,173 of the cost, but still leaves a little over \$86,000. While we have the funds in savings it would be wonderful if the congregation would step up and make additional donations to the project to offset the cost. Write your check out to CLC and in the memo write “organ repair.” Thank you!

Here is some information about the organ you may not be aware of. The organ was moved from the old-old church to the new-old church and survived the fire. After the fire it was carefully dismantled, stored and reinstalled in our current location. While in storage and during the reinstallation into it's current home there were several crucial repairs and updates made to simply keep it functioning for Sunday morning worship, but more has always been needed. Those needed repairs have been kicked down the road long enough. They can no longer be ignored. The air pneumatic pipe chests are wearing out. The air pneumatic pipe chest is literally the pumping heart of the organ. When these chests do wear out (and they will like anything with moving parts) the organ will not function.

This beautiful pipe organ is not only a wonderful part of our heritage but is a very valuable asset and we have the responsibility to keep well maintained and the privilege to have it continue to be a part of our regular worship.

Jean accepted the position here at Christ Lutheran Church in March of this year. She is looking forward to this next chapter of her life. She hopes you will stop by her office and say hello.

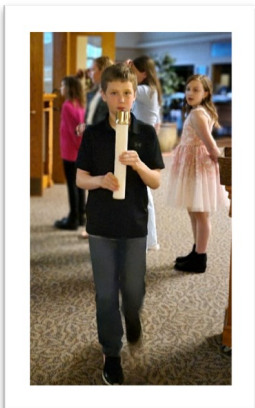
GO AND TELL BY ROGER SLACK

Paul's letter to Philemon is unique in that it is not written to a church, but rather to an individual person. (I'm not counting the letters to Timothy and Titus) The letter revolves around 3 characters, Paul, Philemon (Fi-lee-mon) and Onesimus (Oh-nes-ee-mus). Philemon was a wealthy man in the city of Colossae that became a Christian, a follower of Jesus, as a result of hearing Paul's Gospel message. Because of that, Philemon had a very close friendship with Paul and apparently offered to help meet any needs Paul encountered during his travels and preaching.

The background of this letter involves Philemon and Onesimus' relationship. Philemon was a slave owner (common for the time) and Onesimus was slave belonging to Philemon. Onesimus was tired of being a slave. We don't know what exactly he was responsible for in Philemon's house or business, whether he had access to Philemon's financial dealings (embezzling) or if he just stole something of great value to sell. Either way, He took off to gain his freedom. The law was such that Philemon could have Onesimus killed for the crime. Probably, just like the story of the Prodigal Son, the money ran out and it left Onesimus literally as a "Dead man walking". Onesimus, as a last resort, found Paul in prison in Rome, confessed to him what he had done and, I'm sure, begged Paul to help him. Onesimus, up until now, probably had no time for the message of the Gospel Paul proclaimed, but now listened and too became a follower of Jesus. Onesimus stayed on with Paul for some time after that and proved his conversion was genuine by being a dedicated right hand man for Paul.

Paul wanted to keep Onesimus with him, but thought better of that wanting Philemon to have his say in the matter. Paul wrote the letter and had Onesimus and Tychicus return to Colossae to give the letter to Philemon. I'm sure Onesimus' heart was in his throat approaching Philemon and waiting for him to read Paul's letter. Paul asked Philemon to take whatever harm Onesimus did to him and "charge it to his (Paul's) account, he would repay it". I don't know if Onesimus ever made it back to be of service to Paul in prison, but he was a servant in the church at Colossae, so we know Philemon did forgive him.

It may seem kind of odd that this letter (just $\frac{3}{4}$ of a page) was included when the New Testament was put together, but to me it is the Gospel message brought to life. Paul interceded for Onesimus with Philemon the same way Jesus interceded for each one of us with God the Father. Without Jesus' intervention, we all would be "Dead men walking".

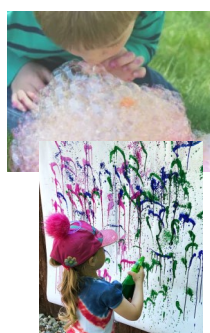

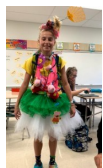


50's and 60's Music, Costume Contests, Limbo Contests and fun fifties food.

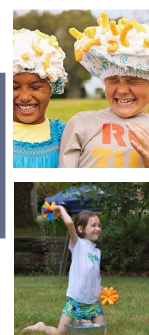

Boundary Waters Canoe Trip 2025

Cost: \$450 \$400 after \$50 campership

As always, to keep our costs down, we pack our own food and tents and provide as many of our own Duluth packs as possible. We have 15. The Outfitter provides the canoes, paddles, life jackets, a few Duluth packs, bunkhouse accommodations for Monday, July 14, breakfast the following morning and a shower when we come off trails. We come off trails the morning of Sunday, July 20, shower and head home. We usually arrive home about 10:00 p.m. For youth who can drive, parents may want to leave a car in the church parking lot. We have permits for Seagull Lake and one for Sag Lake. One group at least will focus on fishing.

We leave early Monday, July 14. By early I mean at 6:00 a.m. That means you need to be at the church by 5:30 a.m. to pack. Why so early? We have 500 miles to travel. Bring food to snack on in the vehicles. We stop at Duluth harbor for lunch. Bring a packed lunch if you like, but food can be purchased there. We will hang out in Grand Marais once we reach it. Sven and Ole's Pizza is once again open on Mondays, so we will stop for a few hours for supper and to look around once we get there. After eating, we finish the trip up the Gunflint to Voyageur Outfitters. The cost of that meal is part of the trip.

What do you do in the Boundary Waters? You paddle, portage, cook your meals over an open fire, swim, fish, enjoy the wilderness and the people you are with. Bring a book to read and some small portable games. We come off the water between 7 - 9:00 a.m. on Sunday, shower, pack up and leave for home. The cost of the trip covers breakfast/lunch at the Mid Trail Cafe about 30 miles south of the Outfitters on the way home as well.

The people who sign up will help determine what the trip looks like, whether we focus on fishing or moving or just sitting around the campsite and enjoying the peace.

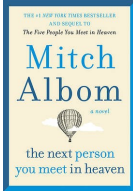

Music Nerds May

"I Love to Tell the Story" is part of a fifty-stanza poem, *The Old, Old Story*, written by Katherine Hankey (1834-1911). The tune and refrain as we know them today are credited to William G. Fisher, a popular conductor for revival meetings and choral programs, in 1869.

Arabella Katherine Hankey was born in Clapham, England, in 1834. She was the daughter of a wealthy London banker and a devotedly Christian mother. Called Kate by her friends, she and her father belonged to an evangelical group led by William Wilberforce. The group opposed slavery and the slave trade and had a great influence in abolishing both in England. Motivated by Christian beliefs, they worked for social reform for the working class and fairness for all. While still a teenager, Katherine organized and taught Sunday School in London. She devoted herself to helping better workers' conditions, taught Bible classes for shop girls, and visited the sick in hospitals.

Inspired by John Wesley, her evangelistic fervor prompted her to travel to South Africa as a missionary nurse. While there she became severely ill and remained bedridden for a long time. During this time in 1866 she wrote the poem. In her later years, she organized Bible classes in the local prisons. She never quit telling the old, old story until she died at age 77 in 1911.

Katherine's life and the hymn she wrote can still instruct us today. The simple story of Jesus' love for us overflows to declare the gospel.
