Perhaps it was not my mother, but God Godself who teaches us how to welcome guests, whether they are family, friends or strangers. We do all we can to make them feel welcomed. Isn't that what cleaning house is really all about? It is a way to honor your guests. And as far as the food, mothers have been cooking more than enough food since the beginning of time and encouraging their guests to "Eat! Eat! Eat!" If a mom says it three times, it is rude not to take another helping.

God does the same for us each and every Sunday. You walk into the church and it is clean. (Thank you Jake and Brian.) Parish Fellowship has prepared coffee and has a spread of food for you to enjoy as you enjoy one another's company. In worship we hear the life giving Word of God and at the table of Holy Communion God offers us food for our souls, the bread and wine of Holy Communion. And we remember all God has done for us to welcome us into the church, God's house for now, and one day into our heavenly home.



## Sunday, July 13th: Worship with Holy Communion


The greatest commandment of all is "Love your neighbor as you love yourself." Just how do we do that? **Preacher:** Pastor Paula

## GO AND TELL BY ROGER SLACK



I still look forward to talking with each of you and hearing your stories of things you have experienced or heard other people tell of the things they have seen God do, here and now. That was the whole intent of "Go and Tell" to encourage one another that God does still work wonders in peoples lives today.

There are people in each one of our lives that has had a special impact on us in some way, either as a youngster or as an adult. One man in my life was a man by the name of Duane Bundt that I met as a freshman in College. Duane grew up in western Iowa and loved finding out someone had a horse that needed to be saddle broke. He started a Bible Study on campus with some kids he had met, including myself. I remember being impressed that when he spoke of God's Love, it was something he knew personally and I wanted that. I had grown up in the Lutheran Church, 12 years of Sunday School, Confirmation in 9<sup>th</sup> grade, but I had failed to understand what God had done for me in Jesus. Being a student, I had it in my head that I needed to get straight A's in life for me to be good enough for God to want in Heaven. The trouble was, on a good day, in my eyes I might get a B. In reality, I wasn't even that close. It was very frustrating and depressing to want something that I knew I didn't have a "snowballs chance" of ever getting. Duane helped me and a lot of other kids to understand that Jesus came to do that which was impossible for me to do by myself. What a relief that was to finally grasp the Good News of the Gospel message.

I found out a few years later that Martin Luther had a very similar story to tell. A frustrating life of never being good enough to satisfy, what he understood to be God's demands on him. Then he read the Bible for himself and came to understand the freedom and inner peace God wanted him to have all along. He translated the Bible into the language of his people because it was that important to him. He wanted them all to be able to read for themselves and understand for themselves God's message of salvation through Christ.

Last year we passed a \$48,000 deficit budget and at the end of the year \$25,000 of our savings was needed to cover the deficit in the budget.

## CHILDREN'S MINISTRY NEWS



In the ELCA, the theme of "God's Work. Our Hands." has motivated ELCA congregations to put our faith into action in tangible ways. One of the reasons I enjoy serving as an ELCA global missionary is the opportunities I have to learn how our Lutheran companion churches around the world are also doing

God's work with their hands. In March, two hurricanes blew through southern Madagascar over a two-week period.

In the southwestern coastal region of Tulear, excessive rains flooded towns and high winds lifted off rooves. In response, churches opened their doors to provide a place for people to sleep, they worked with the government to distribute emergency food, and doctors and nurses from the Malagasy Lutheran Church Healthcare System, which receives support from the ELCA, treated people who were wounded while wading through flood waters. They also distributed free malaria medicine, since flood waters breed from the Malagasy mosquitos, which bring malaria. Malagasy church leaders do not ask if they Lutheran Church Healthcare System cares for people affected can help their neighbors who are affected by frequent natural disasters in Madagascar.

> Instead they find the resources and connections to help more people. A second way the Malagasy Lutheran Church (MLC) engages in God's work is in their understanding of the work of the church. In Madagascar, most people have just enough (and often not enough) to meet their daily needs. As a result, the church sees itself as an agent of development in people's spiritual and physical lives. The diakonia department leads projects that empower vulnerable people. A new project teaches sustainable farming practices in drought-prone areas.

Recently, I have also been invited to teach on stewardship and sustainability at synod Vice-General Secretary gatherings. Our siblings in Christ in Madagascar, like in the ELCA, are working Toromare, Pastor Kristin, Sofia Synod President Eugene Bernard together to use the gifts of God to do the work of God with their hands. teaching about sustainability
