“A Change of Plans”

What is that saying about the best laid plans? “The best laid plans of mice and men often go awry.” The Scottish poet Robert Burns wasn’t the first to put that reality into writing. In fact, we find a similar quotes in Proverbs 16:9 and Proverbs 27:1. “We plan the way we want to

live, but only GOD makes us able to live it.” “Do not boast about tomorrow, for you do not know what a day may bring.”

That is exactly what happened at the beginning of our mission trip. We made plans. We saw to every detail and then there were thunderstorms in Dallas the day our CLC Mission Group was flying to Alaska. It was the only place in the country that day to suffer from bad weather. All planes were grounded in Dallas – American Airline’s hub – for the morning. Because of that grounding our first flight from Madison to Dallas was delayed six hours. That meant we missed our connecting flight in Dallas by about 30 minutes. We were not the only ones experiencing delayed or cancelled flights. Once we got off the plane, which sat on the tarmac for an hour waiting for a gate to open, four of us stood in the Customer Service Line for four hours. The line was blocks long. While in line we called the American Airline’s Customer Service and got a hold of someone from Group Sales. I sat on the phone with Iris for three hours while the others stayed in that line. Iris patiently searched for flights that would get all of us to Anchorage by about 10:30 p.m. the next day. No small feat for a group of 25. She divided us into three groups. We began flying out in the morning with the last group taking off at 6:40 p.m. I thanked Iris for all her work. I told her she was a “Thank you Jesus moment” and I meant it. By the time Nina Milbauer, Jason Hoverson, Jennifer Merryman and Lanie Estervig reached the front of the line Rachel from Customer Service was able to print out our tickets. While we were standing in line others found a place for the group to lay on the floor and get some sleep. It was 1:00 a.m. by the time we all rested our heads. Now that was an adventure I do not want to repeat. About nine of us were in the Dallas Airport for 24 hours while others got a change of scenery in Seattle.

And then there is the BWCA canoe trip. Yesterday (July 13) news came that the BWCA is closed due to dry conditions and fires until Friday, July 17. As I write this I still don’t know if the Boundary Waters will open by Tuesday, July 21, our entry day. Luckily we quickly came up with a plan B and the parents and youth are on board. I’m beginning to wonder after the last few years, if we will ever again be able to plan a mission trip or a canoe trip that runs according to plan, that doesn’t involve a “change of plans.” We’ve had them in the past.

And then I remember, that despite the inconvenience of “a change of plans,” a “change of plans” has taught us the uncomfortable lesson that life is unpredictable. We have less control than we think. *(Continued on page 3)*

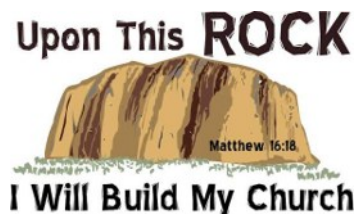


Sunday, August 16: Worship with Holy Communion and Baptism

NEW STOVE UPDATE



New Stove in CLC's Future

It looks like there is a new stove in CLC's future. Repairs were made on Monday, May 18 at a cost of \$4300, but it still is not like new. Some of the most needed parts are no longer available. We can limp along for a while, but sometime this year a new one will be needed.

This item was not in our budget so we will be looking for contributions. We will be ordering directly from the company – eliminating the middle-man. The cost for the repair bill and the new stove is estimated to be about \$15,000. (That is about \$5,000 less than last month.) There is no rush. We have been operating for the last two or three years without one burner and half of the grill not working.

We hope you can get behind this fundraiser. Our stove gets a lot of use with Wednesday Evening Suppers, Lenten Suppers, Senior Luncheons, Harvest Fest, Advent Beginnings, Mardi Gras, Easter Breakfast, Syttende Mai Brunch and Bake Sales. \$500 has already been donated to this cause. The youth have also donated \$5000. Other contribution in the first few weeks have amounted to \$1013, so we have already raised \$6513. We will not go forward on this purchase until all the funds have been raised.

GO AND TELL BY ROGER SLACK



Have you ever met someone that you wished you had their “faith”? To venture into the “unknown” areas of our lives that we often don’t like to go? It may be a job opportunity that involves moving. For some, they are gone tomorrow, but for others it’s really hard to uproot from years of memories and friendships. They are afraid their happiness will never quite be the same because they will be alone in a new place. Or what about illnesses that wreak havoc on this body that I’ve grown kind of fond of? I don’t like to hurt. I don’t like not being able to do something I was always pretty good at when I was younger. It serves to remind me, and all of us, that our days in this body are numbered.

Just what is “faith”? Another word for it is “trust”. The disciples found out that when Jesus said they could heal the sick, or feed 5,000 people with just a small lunch, or walk on water during a storm, they could do it. Once we made it to North Star United Methodist Church in Nikiski, Alaska things ran smoothly. We were tired after our travel adventures (we got to our final destination at 4:00 a.m.), but we quickly blew up our air mattresses and crawled into bed for a few hours rest before breakfast at 8:00 a.m. and church at 9:00 a.m. The people from North Star United Methodist were wonderfully welcoming. They served us a potluck lunch following worship on Sunday and on Thursday evening pulled out all the stops and served up Salmon, Crab and Stir Fry Moose. The side dishes looked awfully familiar. One in particular caught my eye – orange Jell-o with mandarin oranges, cottage cheese and whipped cream. It was good!

Our mission works involved doing repairs at North Star United Methodist and the Food Bank in Soldotna. We sent 9 to 12 people to the Kenai Peninsula Food Bank Tuesday – Thursday from 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. That facility is simply amazing. It was the size of a warehouse and that warehouse was stocked full with pallets of food. The warehouse also housed the Firewood Diner where a free lunch was served Monday – Fridays from 11:30 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. They even had a huge garden where they grew their own fresh produce for the diner.

Everyone talked to everyone, young and old. We talked a lot. We laughed a lot. We had a good time!

It is that time of year again. Time to start planning for the 2026 –2027 Sunday School/ Youth School year.

Rally Sunday will be Sunday, September 13th. Rally Sunday is the start of our fall schedule which includes the Worship Lite Service: **(Family Express service at 9:15 a.m. and Sunday school will begin in the Large Youth Room at 10:00 a.m. for all students).**

They will be introduced to their teaching staff and welcomed by our entire staff before breaking up into their individual groups to get better acquainted with their fellow classmates and teachers. Registration forms will be located in the Sunday School Hallway on the Information Bulletin Board or at the office. If it's not there, please use last year's 2025-26 forms online.

Parents we have many special events each year for our kids. These events are called **Milestone Ministries**. These are special occasions meant to help link parent, child and the Christian faith with our Church. These Milestone events start at age 3 and go all the way through High School Graduation. When you register your child for Sunday School and/or confirmation you will receive a poster with dates for each event and are listed in the announcements at church, and in the Ambassador. We also send out postcards, emails and or letters to remind you of these special upcoming events.

Here are the milestone events each year:

3 Year-olds— receive their first Bible on 3/21/27

1st Graders— make an Advent Log on 11/22/26

2nd Graders— make a Lenten Cross on 3/14/27

3rd Graders— receive their Adventure Bibles on 10/25/26

4th Graders— have their first Communion Instruction Classes and receive their First Communion on 3/25/27

7th and 8th Graders— start their Confirmation Classes on 9/16/26

9th Graders— Affirm their Faith and become adult members of the Church on 10/25/26

12th Grade Graduates— are celebrated at a Baccalaureate Service on 5/23/27



If you have a 7th or 8th Grade student, the **Confirmation Orientation Meeting for Students and Parents is on Wednesday, September 16th at 6:00 p.m.** Please make sure you can attend, we will go over all requirements for Confirmation and register all of our confirmation students for the 2026-2027 session.

Confirmation classes will begin the following week with dinner at 5:30 p.m. and class from 6:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. 7th Grade students will have to set up a time to meet with Mary Onsager to train on being an acolyte. They will work with our 9th

Baby Care Kits



TWO lightweight cotton t-shirts (no Onesies ®)

TWO long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (without feet)

TWO receiving blankets, medium-weight cotton or flannel, or crocheted or knitted with lightweight yarn, between 36" and 52" square

FOUR cloth diapers, flat fold preferred

ONE jacket, sweater or sweatshirt with a hood, or include a baby cap

TWO pairs of socks

ONE hand towel, dark color recommended

TWO or three bath-size bars of gentle soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping; no mini or hotel size bars

TWO diaper pins or large safety pins

Personal Care Kits



ONE light-weight bath-size towel (between 20" x 40" and 52" x 27"), dark color recommended

TWO or three bath-size bars of soap equaling 8 to 9 oz., any brand, in original wrapping

ONE adult-size toothbrush in it's original packaging*

ONE sturdy comb, remove packaging

ONE metal nail clippers (attached file optional), remove packaging *

*Toothbrush multi-packs may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business-size envelope; no plastic bags or wrap

School Kits



FOUR 70-sheet notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper, approximately 8" x 10 1/2"; no loose leaf paper

ONE 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other

ONE pencil sharpener

ONE pair of blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)

2026 BUDGET UPDATE BY DAVID ERDMAN, INTERIM TREASURER



Holding On But...

The congregation of Christ Lutheran Church approved a balanced budget in February 2026 that assumed a 2% growth in pledged and non-pledged offerings. The approved budget also included a \$20,600 transfer from the Special Projects Fund that was intended to be repaid at the end of year with contributed support beyond this 2% assumption.

At June 30, 2026, or half-way through the budget year, our increase in offerings compared to June 30, 2025 is barely at the 2% assumption, but lacks in the goal of having \$20,600 of additional revenue to address the transfer from the Special Projects Fund. We noted that an additional \$126 was needed from each giving unit (based on 2025 support) to offset this transfer – this was in addition to the assumed 2% growth.

In addition, as we have all experienced thus far in 2026, the price of many essential items is higher than expected. While we budgeted additional moneys for anticipated utility increases, the price of gas has been even higher than predicted. As of June 30, 2026, we have already expended all of the funds budgeted for gas. Other unanticipated repairs have also been needed; the result is expenditures are higher than expected at this point in the year.

In short, after the first six months of 2026 the Christ Lutheran Church budget is holding. However, with expenditures trending higher than anticipated we ask that the congregation give more focus to their contributions so that the \$20,600 revenue transfer can be repaid at the end of 2026. The 130-Year Journey of the Pipe Organ at Christ Lutheran Church

Many of you have asked about the history of our pipe organ, and I was just as curious myself. This summer, I spent some time digging through old files and taking a walk down memory lane. What follows are some of the highlights of our organ's journey: from its beginnings to the many updates and restorations that have helped it grow and serve our congregation over the past 130 years. As I researched its history, I was reminded of how faithfully our congregation has cared for and appreciated this beautiful instrument through the generations.

Our pipe organ was purchased in 1896 for the original wooden church from the Schulke Organ Company of Milwaukee. It originally had 13 ranks of pipes, and the date 1897 is still written on one of the Subbass 16' pipes.

In 1915, the Wangerin & Weickhardt Organ Company moved the organ into the new brick church. Remarkably, no upgrades or changes were needed during the move.

As I looked through old church bulletins, I found several interesting updates from 1938 that give us a glimpse into the care and concern our congregation had for the organ.

From the April 10, 1938 bulletin:

"Our church organ is in need of repairs. A pipe organ is a very delicate instrument. Among other things hundreds of small pieces of leather are used in its construction. These must now be replaced. Several keys are now out of commission with more due to follow at any time. The trustees of the church are now receiving subscriptions towards repairing the organ. Your support will be appreciated."

From the June 12, 1938 bulletin:

"Workers from the Verlinden Organ Company have been busy the past two weeks repairing the organ. The work has now been completed, the worn-out parts restored and the entire organ re-regulated and put in first class condition. Thanks to all who have contributed towards this worthy and necessary project. By the way, in our last bulletin we reported \$100.00 still needed. This is still true. Will you help? See the treasurer."

And from the June 26, 1938 bulletin:

"Workers from the Verlinden Organ Company have been busy the past two weeks repairing the organ. The work has now been completed, the worn-out parts restored and the entire organ re-regulated and put in first class condition. Thanks to all who have contributed towards this worthy and necessary project. By the way, in our last bulletin we reported \$100.00 still needed. This is still true. Will you help? See the treasurer."

Following a small altar fire in 1949, the sanctuary was remodeled. During that project, the Schantz Organ Company built a new detached console, and a Crescendo pedal was added.

In 1973, Norbert Berschdorf of Milwaukee, Wisconsin, made significant improvements by dividing the manuals into two chambers located at the front left and right sides of the sanctuary. He also added five ranks to the Swell division and six ranks to the Great division.

When a new sanctuary was built in 1999 to replace the 1915 brick church, Fred Hermes transferred the organ to its new home. Once again, no upgrades or changes were needed during the installation.

In 2005, our church experienced a devastating fire that destroyed much of the church and attached school. Thankfully, the organ was protected behind a firewall and survived. The pipes and chests were removed from the damaged building, placed in storage, and later reinstalled in the new sanctuary at 700 County Highway B in 2007 by Fred Hermes. Organ Supply Industries built a new console to replace the one that had been damaged by water. (Continued on back cover)

Additional improvements were made in 2013 by Fabry, Inc. of Antioch, Illinois. A new Nasard 2□' rank was added to the Swell division, and the Great division received a new Gemshorn rank that was carefully voiced to blend with the existing pipes.

Most recently, in 2026, Fabry completed a significant upgrade. They replaced the 1938 air-pneumatic pipe chests with modern electric valve air pipe chests that will never require re-leathering. They also rebuilt the wooden support structure with new materials and a new configuration to make better use of the organ chamber for its 24 ranks of pipes. While doing this work on the organ, they did a corrective voicing for the entire instrument.

Looking back over these 130 years, I was humbled by the dedication of those who came before us. Generations have invested in preserving and improving this remarkable instrument so that it can continue to lead worship and enrich our congregation's music ministry. It truly is a wonderful part of Christ Lutheran Church's history, and I hope it will continue to serve our congregation for many years to come.
